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## Foreword

The Government of Punjab is committed to empowering women and girls by addressing key gender gaps and barriers that prevent them from fully benefiting from the state's development initiatives. Significant achievements have been realized through various policy initiatives introduced in recent years, including addressing the imbalance in sex ratio, promoting education for girls, and enhancing maternal health. Nevertheless, numerous gender gaps persist, necessitating stronger policy commitments and programmatic interventions.


Gender Responsive Budgeting (GRB) ensures that the state budget integrates a gender perspective, enabling resources to be effectively targeted towards addressing gender disparities and inequities. Formally adopted in FY 2022-23, GRB aims to significantly strengthen Punjab's commitment to gender equality. A comprehensive preparatory process was undertaken for the preparation of the Gender Budget Statement (GBS). This included intensive sensitization of departmental staff regarding gender equality and budgeting, creating internal mechanisms to oversee and monitor gender budgeting practices, and deliberately learning from the experiences of other states.

In FY 2022-23, the GBS was developed using data from four departments: the Department of Social Security and Women & Child Development (DoSSWCD), the Department of Rural Development, the Labour Department, and the Department of Social Justice and Empowerment of Minorities. This scope expanded to six departments in FY 2024-25 by including the Department of School Education and the Department of Technical Education and Industrial Training. Further expansion took place in FY 2025-26, incorporating data from two additional departments: the Department of Higher Education and Languages, and the Department of Food, Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs.

Based on this data, the total size of the gender budget for FY 2025-26 is Rs. 16,762.25 crore. A significant portion (67.78%) of the gender budget comprises schemes from two key departments—DoSSWCD (45.67%, Rs. 7,656.31 crore) and the Department of School Education (22.11%, Rs. 3,706.81 crore). This clearly demonstrates the need for the state to comprehensively expand gender-informed budget planning processes in all future budget preparations.

It is our endeavor that all departments adopt gender-informed budget planning starting from the next financial year, using it as a tool to continually review ongoing programs and policies, enhance their outreach, strengthen gender impacts, and identify additional areas requiring improvements, either through increased resource allocation or improved targeting.

Under the able guidance of the Hon'ble Chief Minister of Punjab, I am pleased to present the Punjab Gender Budget for FY 2025-26.

**Introduction:**

Punjab is one of the economically advanced states in India. It is the 15<sup>th</sup> most populated state in India with a population of 2.7 crores. Primarily an agricultural state, nearly 63 percent of its population lives in rural areas. Punjab also ranks among the most developed of India's states with high per capita income, high Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP) and low levels of poverty.

According to census 2011, women constitute 47.23% of the total population of the state as compared to 48.5% at national level. There has been an improvement in sex ratio of the state. As per the 2011 census sex ratio is 895 vis-a-vis 876 in census 2001. Child sex ratio has also increased from 798 in 2001 to 846 in 2011. There has been an improvement in sex ratio at birth of the state. As per report of Health Management Information System (HMIS), Ministry of Women and Child Development, Government of India, the sex ratio at birth has been improved to 923/1000 in FY 2023-24 as compared to 891/1000 in FY 2015-16. Female literacy rate has increased from 63.5% in 2001 to 70.7% in 2011. Gender commitments need to transform into financial commitments. State needs to create system and functionaries working at grassroots to reduce inequality of income and opportunities. Therefore, inclusion of women at every level is extremely important.

**Focus Areas Highlighted by the Punjab Vision Document:**

Vision document highlights that despite the availability of resources in the state, there are stark gender gaps in terms of access to food, health, income, assets and justice. The document clearly notes that development benefits have spread to living conditions and education but the lack of access to basic facilities adversely affect women's health and nutrition outcomes, increases learning disparities, and infrastructural discrepancies lead to increased burden of care work and household chores, especially that of collecting water.

State's nutrition indicators highlight significant female undernourishment in spite of high food consumption. Another gap pertains to education and livelihood outcomes. The state ranks relatively high on female education rates in the country with almost 38 percent completion rates among girls in secondary education and 10 percent female completion rates for graduates.

In Punjab, more women are involved in unpaid work and spend about the same number of hours in unpaid work (7.6 hours per day) as men spend in paid work (7 hours per day) (OECD 2014). Work without recognition is also reflected in ownership patterns. Though women are engaged in agricultural operations with 10,000 female farmers, they operate only 1 percent of the total area (Punjab Vision document, 2030).

Vision document rightly notes that the diverse and new types of gender discrimination and violence against women are not adequately captured. There is insufficient information to guide policy and to develop effective measures to combat such 'culturally accepted' yet specific forms of mental and physical forms of violence in the state.

**State's Efforts to Address Gender Inequality:**

The State government has undertaken concerted efforts to address the issues that pose challenges to the well-being and development of women and girls in Punjab.

The State Hub for Empowerment of Women (SHEW) is mandated to give focused attention to inter-sectoral issues affecting women by conducting research, maintaining gender-related data, and engaging in training and capacity-building programs. These efforts aim to enhance understanding of



women's issues, particularly highlighting the experiences of women from vulnerable and marginalized communities. Furthermore, in alignment with the State Hub for Empowerment of Women (SHEW), District Hubs for Empowerment of Women have been established in each district of Punjab.

The SHEW oversees the implementation of 14 key schemes, including flagship initiatives such as the Mata Tripta Yojana, Udaan scheme (distribution of sanitary napkins), Free Bus Travel Facility for Women, and 33% reservation for women in government jobs, as well as central schemes like the Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yojana, Beti Bachao Beti Padhao, Women Helpline-181, Working Women Hostel, and One Stop Centre.

The Udaan sub-scheme under the Mata Tripta Yojana is a significant initiative launched in May 2022. Under this scheme, sanitary napkins are provided free of cost to women and girls in Punjab. Each of the 27,314 Anganwadi Centres across the state distributes nine free sanitary pads monthly to 50 women or girls, covering a total of 13,65,700 beneficiaries each month.

The approval of Working Women Hostels at SAS Nagar (Mohali), Jalandhar and Amritsar also deserves mention as it will address the issues of women mobility and accessibility of jobs with the view to encourage the female participation in total workforce. The Mai Bhago Vidhya Scheme is also focusing the women empowerment through enrolment in education by providing free bicycles to all female students studying in classes 9 to 12.

Additionally, recognizing the importance of safe, affordable, and accessible transportation in advancing the status of women and girls, the state government offers free bus travel in all state-owned buses, including those operated by Punjab Roadways Transport Corporation (PRTC) and Punjab Roadways Buses (PUNBUS), without restrictions based on age or income. These initiatives are only a few examples of the government's ongoing efforts to enhance gender equality and achieve the Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 5 targets.

The Punjab Civil Services (Reservation of Posts for Women) Rules have been formulated and implemented to provide 33% reservation for women across all categories in government appointments to Group A, B, C, and D posts, including those in Boards and Corporations. These rules aim to empower all women in the state, enhancing their self-esteem and positively impacting entire families.

## **Overview of Gender Responsive Budgeting**

Government of Punjab is committed towards empowerment of women and girls across all key human development indicators. Significant achievements have been made towards girl child education and improved maternal health and this has happened due to targeted policy and programme interventions. Yet, as discussed above, there are some persistent gender gaps, highlighting the need for more effective and innovative solutions to how currently the designing, implementation and monitoring our schemes and programmes is undertaken. Gender Responsive Budgeting (GRB) is one such effective tool to ensure budgets integrate a gender perspective and ensure resources are better targeted towards addressing gender gaps and inequities. It is thus a vital tool in reducing gendered inequalities and implementing a gender transformative agenda.

Government of Punjab has introduced Gender Budgeting to ensure integration of Gender Equity and Equality in all the development processes and plans of the State. The Department of Social Security,

Women and Child Development has been designated as the nodal department for implementing Gender Responsive Budgeting in the state.

Based on the information received from certain select departments, the Department of Social Security, Women and Child Development along with the Department of Finance works together to formulate the Gender Budget Statement. The Gender Budget Statement (GBS) presents information regarding programs/schemes in each sector and is usually presented under three categories:

- **Part A** - 100% women specific schemes: All policies/programs/schemes which are wholly targeted for women and girl beneficiaries shall be placed in this part.
- **Part B** - Schemes with 30% to 99% expenditure on women-related components: Many sectors address important gaps or needs for the entire population. However, in realizing that women and girls may have specific constraints in accessing these programmes or schemes, they may have earmarked additional resources/budgets for women and girls. It is also possible that even if not earmarked, their actual expenditure does show a preferential targeting of women. Therefore, the schemes with 30% to 99% expenditure on women-related component are placed in this part.
- **Part C** - Schemes with under 30% expenditure on women: This part includes policies that are not designed nor specifically targeted towards women and girls. However, actual expenditures may show under 30% of the expenditures are towards women and girls.

For the financial year, **2025-26** following eight departments have reported women specific allocations:

1. Department of Social Security and Development of Women and Children.
2. Department of Social Justice, Empowerment and Minorities.
3. Department of Rural Development and Panchayats.
4. Department of Labour.
5. Department of School Education.
6. Department of Technical Education and Industrial Training.
7. Department of Higher Education and Languages.
8. Food, Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs.

In the coming years, the process of Gender Budgeting needs to be expanded to all departments to meet the objective of mainstreaming gender concerns into the policy planning and designing stages. Similarly, streamlining of processes, capacity building measures and robust institutionalization is crucial to meet the objective of a tool like GRB.

It is vital to ensure that the process of planning and designing of policies, schemes and programmes should adopt a gender responsive approach backed by adequate resource allocation. The Government of Punjab led by the Department of Social Security, Women and Child Development is committed to taking sustained efforts in achieving this goal by expanding GRB to all departments in due course.

### **Summary of the Gender Budget Statement**

A comprehensive preparatory process was undertaken towards the preparation of Gender Budget Statement (GBS). This included an intensive process of sensitising departmental staff on gender equality and gender budgeting, creating internal mechanisms to oversee and monitor the adoption of gender budgeting as well as a deliberate effort to learn from experiences of other states. GBS draws on data from eight departments- namely DoSSWCD, Rural Department, Labour Department and

Department of Social Justice and Empowerment of Minorities, Department of School Education, Department of Technical Education and Industrial Training, Department of Higher Education and Languages, and Food, Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs. Based on this data, the total size of the gender budget for the 2025-26 period is Rs. 16762.25 crore. A part (67.78) of the gender budget comprises of schemes from two key departments namely – DoSSWCD and Punjab School Education Department- **45.67% (7656.31 cr)** and **22.11% (3706.81 cr)** respectively:
